Multi-Culturalism:

A Nation-Building Principle Long Upheld By Jamiyah Singapore

Since Independence in 1965, 'Multiculturalism' was adopted by the Government as one of the key pillars of our nation-building agenda. Although the original policy was then described as 'Multiracialism', the intent was similar, that is, how to bring the different races (Malays, Chinese, Indians, Eurasians, Others) together towards making this Republic a stable and prosperous country. In the early years, different integrative models were tried and over time, the earlier approach in trying to merge the different ethnic and cultural into a common citizenship mould was reviewed. This new experiment not only allowed the different races to enjoy and celebrate their particularistic cultural ethos and traditions, but to embrace these diversities and differences as assets to Singapore.

Jamiyah too adopted a similar cautious multiracial approach in its early relations with other ethnic and religious communities. This was understandable since in the early 1960's, there was little racial and religious collaboration in this Republic. As an example, it was

taboo for any Muslim organisation to work closely with a Buddhist or Taoist Temple or an Indian Temple or a Christian Church; such collaboration was then considered as somewhat 'unIslamic'. But times have changed and Singapore society itself has changed, albeit gradually, to become a more accommodationist and inclusive multicultural society. A close study of Jamiyah's multicultural leaning will indeed reveal that our association – now entering our 86th anniversary – has in fact been a pioneer in inter-ethnic and inter-faith relations way back during colonial times, predating Singapore's Independence. An example was the meeting and discussions that led to the formation of the *Inter-Religious Organization (IRO)*.

Historical records shows that a lunch party was initiated by Syed Hashim Omar Alsagoff, the then President of the Muslim Missionary Society of Singapore, at his residence at No 41 Chancery Lane on 15 January 1949.

At that party, given in honour of Maulana Abdul Aleem Siddique, the Founder of the Muslim Missionary Society (and one affectionately called the 'Roving Ambassador of Peace'), the idea of the IRO was mooted by the Maulana. That meeting was also attended by His Excellency Mr Malcom McDonald, the British Commissioner-General for Southeast Asia and leaders of all the major religions in Singapore.

By the 1990s, Jamiyah Singapore was already known for its outreach programs with other racial and religious groups. Thus, it was not a surprise that in 2006, the Ambassador of US-Mexico's Chamber of Commerce, Mr Ramos Gomez, conferred a Special Award to the former President of Jamiyah Singapore, the late Haji Abu Bakar Maidin. This was in recognition of his 'exceptional example to humankind, as promoter of universal values aimed at building a better world based on respect to each others' race, faith and culture'. A decade later, seeing the consistency of Jamiyah's multicultural activities, the Ambassador helped Jamiyah in launching the 'Touch of Harmony Programme' with New York University.

Since then, and after a series of similar inter-racial and inter-religious events and projects, many Government Ministers lauded Jamiyah's contributions to the national effort to better integrate the Republic's diverse population. Even the first Prime Minister of Singapore, the late Mr Lee Kuan Yew, went public to congratulate Jamiyah for building bridges to other communities and as one of the 'Force of Moderation' in this country. Mr Lee remarked that Jamiyah "had reached out to other religious groups promoting understanding and goodwill". Echoes of similar sentiments were similarly declared by the former President of Singapore, the late Mr SR Nathan, when Jamiyah celebrated its 70th Anniversary, adding, "Not only reflect Jamiyah's recognition of the multi-racial and multi-religious nature of our Society, but more importantly its commitment in playing its part towards our efforts to develop national social cohesion in our society".

From 2007, Jamiyah hosted a series of annual peace and educational seminars with ISESCO (Islamic Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation) starting with a 5-day Seminar (21-15 June 2007) on the theme of 'Role

of Community and Faith Leaders Towards Promoting The Culture of Durable and Lasting Peace'. On 22-23 November 2008, Jamiyah organised a 2-Day Seminar on 'Harmony, Peace and Universal Values: Buddhism & Islamic Perspective'.

In May 2010, Jamiyah initiated a 2-Day 'Dialogue on Buddhism & Islamic Perspective' in Cambodia, together with the Cambodian International Youth Association (CIYA). As recent as October 2017, this ISESCO-JAMIYAH seminar was expanded to include participants from more than 20 countries on the theme of 'Role of Muslim NGOs in Promoting the Culture of Peace'. In all of these seminars, conscious efforts were made to invite and include participants and observers from all races and faiths.

The list of Jamiyah's collaboration with fellow racial and religious communities in Singapore is long. The following are some examples of such multicultural collaboration, usually in the field of social welfare and inter-faith understanding, and the benefits accrued from such efforts:

- ✓ Singapore Buddhist Lodge's bursaries for students of Jamiyah's Children's Home and children of families in Community Outreach & Development Department
- ✓ The SOKA Association conferred the 'Universal Brotherhood Award' to the former President of Jamiyah Mr Abu Bakar Maidin
- ✓ The Church of The Latter Day Saints invited Jamiyah's representatives to attend an international conference in Utah, United States
- ✓ The Catholic Archdiocese invited Jamiyah to some of its activities and events
- ✓ The Hindu Endowments Board invited Jamiyah to some of its social and cultural events

From the above collaborative endeavours and many more of such initiatives, hopefully, Jamiyah Singapore can continue to play its part in buttressing the multicultural environment in Singapore.

5 Mass food ration/ filming for "Projek Hurlurkan Tangan"

Jamiyah's Communications and Studio department organised the filming for 'Projek Hurlurkan Tangan'. Various artistes such as Gloria Tan, Ummi Abdullah, and Sarah Aqilah distributed the rations to selected food ration beneficiaries and even interviewed some of them.

The second event was held at Jamiyah HQ. 40 out of 42 beneficiaries collected their food rations and again, 8 of whom are Indians and Chinese.

CODD kicked off the FEC programme for 2018 with a group support session in the form of a Forum Theatre organised by Asiawerkz Communications.

JamPacked FoodBank with Celebrities

FoodBank held its JamPacked Food event at the warehouse as well as Jamiyah Headquarters on the 24th and 25th February 2018.

The event on both days involved 10 celebrity teams and more than 100 families receiving their food ration packs.

These celebrity teams were filmed as they helped with the distribution and their interaction with the beneficiaries. Many of these celebrities - all of them did not know about the existence of FoodBank - weep as they listened to the plights shared by the beneficiaries. They didn't realise there were pockets of people in Singapore who could not even afford proper meals, even though these people looked 'normal'.

Celebrities Resolved: To do more for the less fortunate

- 1** One of the celebrities, a Real-Estate agent, would like to provide free talks and property advices to our beneficiaries. He feels that with more grants and schemes provided by the government, more low income families should be able to afford to finance their own flat, such as a 2 room flexi flat, or a flat with a shorter lease of say 30 years instead of 99 years.
- 2** Another team of celebrities, who are chefs and owned a few restaurants island wide, would like to conduct cooking demonstrations and lessons for our low income mothers so that they can use this skill to provide some form of small catering services from home, and assist with their families' income.

Foodbank will be liaising with our Community Outreach and Development Department (CODD) on the offer of help from these good souls and hopefully, CODD could provide follow up programmes which will benefit our beneficiaries and recipients.

For The Love of the Prophet: A Forum and a Feast

In collaboration with the Pasar Geylang Merchant Association, Jamiyah Singapore held a forum on Saturday, 17 March 2018 entitled "Membuka Pintu Rezeki" (Opening the Doors of Prosperity). The forum involved a panel of popular and well-loved speakers like Dato' Ustaz Badli Shah bin Alauddin from Malaysia and Ustaz Omar Maulana, leader of the Qafilah Zikrullah Qasidah ensemble. Ustaz Muhammad Nuzhan, a graduate from Egypt's Al-Azhar University (in Quranic Exegesis and its Sciences) who is currently an Executive Officer at Jamiyah Ar-Rabitah Mosque in Dakwah and Youth Development, was also part of the forum held in the heart of Geylang Serai, 17 March 2018.

In the spirit of commemorating the Maulid, a "Selawat" session was conducted by Qafilah Zikrullah. The episode united the audience in expressing their love for Rasulullah (pbuh).

The joyous celebrations continued onto the next day with a 'Mass Makan Briyani' event to which Jamiyah's Darul Ma'wa residents were also invited. Besides practising the sunnah of eating together as a means of strengthening feelings of brotherhood and conviviality among the community, the 'Mass Makan Briyani' was also in line with the Islamic practice of giving food to others, especially the needy and less fortunate - and who doesn't like Briyani?



GLOSSARY

- **Qaseedah*: a panegyric, usually a poem in praise of the Prophet.
- **Selawat*: salutations and praises upon the Prophet.
- **Maulid*: Remembering the birth of the Prophet.
- **Pbuh*: abbreviation meaning 'Peace Be Upon Him', a common phrase uttered every time the name of the Prophet is mentioned.
- **Sunnah*: a recommended act practised by the Prophet and for which Muslims are enjoined to follow suit.

Beefing Up Jamiyah Education Centre (JEC)

The beginning of 2018 brought with it new and exciting changes to JEC, Jamiyah's very own educational learning centre, which offers both full-time and part-time classes from kindergarten to degree level. In its endeavour to produce progressive Muslims whose existence and contributions benefit all, three new staff were brought in to beef up and reinvigorate JEC as a whole.

The new staff are all graduates and have a wealth of knowledge in the field of (Islamic) education: Dr. Mohd Ghazali bin Mohd Said, a lecturer with a PhD in Islamic Education and two young graduates from Malaysia's leading universities. Ms Shahidah Osman has a degree in Usuluddin & Comparative Religion from International Islamic University Malaysia and has also completed memorizing the whole Quran, while Ms Sitti Uzaizah Zahidah Yusoff graduated with First-Class Honours in Quran and Sunnah Studies from Universiti Sains Islam Malaysia. As programme coordinators cum lecturers, they will be in charge of current JEC courses like Little Huffaz and the JEC-KUIM Diploma in Syariah Islamiyyah and Diploma in Tahfiz wal Qiraat respectively.

Additionally, together with existing JEC staff which consists of graduates from Egypt's renowned Al-Azhar University and other Malaysian universities - Ustazah Susilawati and Ruwaida - the whole team are determined to work towards strengthening existing programmes and introducing new signature Quran programmes. While also striving to upgrade the professional (academic) courses currently offered at JEC, they also intend to upgrade our Madrasah programs. This is in line with the vision charted by JEC's Chairman, Dr. Hussin Motalib (whose experience include serving the NUS for more than 3 decades) and the able support of Ms Nurzakiah Jumathi (our longest-serving team member) who is now the new Vice-Principal.

It is hoped that their combined expertise and experience will help raise JEC to new heights and turn JEC into one of the leading providers of Islamic education, both in the academic and religious fields.

SPARK ACHIEVEMENT

We are the first Muslim Voluntary Welfare Organisation (VWO) to have achieved the SPARK Accreditation in 2015 and also achieve SPARK Commendation in 2018. Kudos to the Centre's staff!

On 14th Feb 2018, a SPARK Assessor came to the Centre to conduct the SPARK Developmental Visit. From 2016, the validity period for SPARK certification is extended to six years and the practice is for the SPARK certification, Developmental Visits to be conducted during the third year.

It was a half-day visit and the focus was on the centre's teaching and learning practices and improvements made over the past 3 years. The Assessor toured the centre, observed K1 and K2 lessons and had a discussion with Miss Rahimah to provide guidance for centre quality improvement. On 1st March 2018, the centre received the happy results for the Developmental Visit: The Centre has achieved Sparks Certification (Commendation) standard and the certification is extended for another 3 years. Alhamdulillah!

Darul Syifaa's Participation With Community Partners

Jamiyah Nursing Home (JNH)

The first weekend of February 2018 was an eventful one for Jamiyah Nursing Home. Two projects were organized on consecutive days, together with our service partners and stakeholders. On 2nd February 2018, JNH had a unique opportunity to participate in the Opening Ceremony of a Global Conference on Integrated Care, focusing on the theme of caring for seniors and the elderly in Singapore. On 3rd February 2018, Ng Teng Fong General Hospital (NTFGH) organized "Healthy Home - Happy Family Carnival 2018" for the residents /clients of JNH and their families.

The Global Conference on Integrated Care, organized by the Agency for Integrated Care (AIC) from 2nd to 4th February 2018, brought together health and social care experts, practitioners, professionals and policy makers from around the world under one roof, to present and discuss an array of topics related to integrated care. It provided a platform for the sharing of best practices and experiences that participants could bring back to their organisations.

Preparations for the performance at the Opening Ceremony started much earlier with a theatre workshop held at Jamiyah Nursing Home on 28 November 2017. Conducted by US practitioner, Ms Debra Campbell, the workshop was an interactive session in which over 20 residents of the Nursing Home and clients of the Senior Care Centre participated. Ms Campbell is the Founder and Executive Director of Arts & AGEing KC and a creative ageing specialist with a Masters of Science degree in Social Gerontology. She has over 20 years' experience working with diverse populations of older adults and has been implementing ageing programmes that were inspired by life storytelling across generations. The workshop also accorded the Nursing Home staff the opportunity to learn techniques of engaging the elderly and getting them to share memories and views.

After the workshop, a few of the residents were shortlisted and trained at follow up sessions to fine-tune their presentations and roles in the final performance, staged before the Guest of Honour, Mr Gan Kim Yong, Minister of Health, along with 5 other service providers. The performance was enjoyed and much appreciated by all present.

On 3rd February, the Ng Teng Fong General Hospital's "Healthy Home 2018" health carnival, was held at JNH. The aim was to raise the health literacy and awareness of residents and clients of JNH and their families, and empower them to better take charge of their health. More than 160 elderly residents and clients of JNH and their families, and 200 staff volunteers from NTFGH, participated in the activities. Various health education booths were erected to help the residents understand health information and services to enable them make appropriate health-related decisions and create more awareness on such matters. In addition to the fun booths for photography, popcorn and balloon sculpting, information booths were also set up. Information was made available about Oral Hygiene by the Dentistry team, Advanced Care Planning by Medical Social Workers, Healthy Eating for the Elderly by the Dietetics and Nutrition team, Interactive game booths by the Rehabilitation team, and the Hearing test facility by the Audiology team of the NTFGH.

NTFGH also raised funds from their staff amounting to \$15,000 in donations which was used to purchase wheelchairs, commodes and television sets for the residents. These were presented at the carnival by the CEO of NTFGH, Mr Foo Hee Jug to Mr Shaick Fakrudeen s/o S Ali, Treasurer General of Jamiyah Singapore. The event was also witnessed by Exco members and senior management of Jamiyah Singapore and NTFGH and received positive feedback from the participants.



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Jamiyah Home For The Aged (JHA)

The granting of this extension illustrates the Government's confidence in Jamiyah to continue manage its Welfare Homes. By the same token, it illustrates our compliance to the strict requirements as stipulated by the Ministry of Health. JHA complements the work of Jamiyah Nursing Home (Darul Syifa) by adding meaning to the life of the aged at the Home, who are either restricted in their physical movement due to ageing or on wheel-chairs or walking sticks.

To help the aged involve themselves in useful daily activities, the staff of Darul Takrim organise interesting and exciting programs and activities that suits the particular requirements of the aged in the Home. Festivals such as the celebrations commemorating New Year, Chinese New Year, Hari Raya, Deepavali and Christmas, are celebrated with much fun and joy.

This particular Home is a manifestation of Jamiyah's commitment to serve the varying needs of the community. Since the 1970s, Darul Takrim has broadened its services towards community service, from merely focussing on its earlier inter-religious activities.

These staff are trained to make their stay in the Home as pleasant and as beneficial as possible. Jamiyah Children's Home (JCH) Routines & Rituals in Darul Ma'wa

Families make use of "routines" to organize themselves, get things done, spend time together and have fun. In the same way, the residents at Darul Ma'wa also do practice routines. Daily life is often smoother with a few routines, but there is more to routines than this. Routines also let our residents know what is important in the Home, such as the ritual of performing solat (prayers). Performing solat in a group (jemaah) can help not only a Muslim's brotherhood with each other but also strengthen our shared beliefs and values, and build a sense of belonging and togetherness within the Darul Ma'wa family.

Children: Why routines are good for them

Some children like and need routine more than others. In general, though, routines have the following benefits for children:

Safety and Belonging

An organized and predictable Home environment helps children and teenagers feel safe, secure and looked after, particularly in stressful times or during difficult stages of development, like puberty.

Skills and Responsibility

Having chores to do within the framework of Home routines, helps children and teenagers develop a sense of responsibility and some basic skills like the ability to manage time. And

when the residents can do their parts of the routine with less help or supervision from staff, it also helps them become more independent.

Healthy habits

Routines can be a way of teaching younger children healthy habits, like brushing their teeth, taking medicine regularly, getting some exercise, or washing their hands after using the toilet.

Routines at Darul Ma'wa

The residents of Darul Ma'wa wake up at 5.30 every morning and prepare to perform their solat Subuh in congregation. After solat they have their breakfast and proceed to go to school. Upon returning, they perform their solat Zuhur or Asr and have their lunch or dinner. Completing homework or school projects take up the rest of the afternoon. After dinner, the residents perform their Jemaah Maghrib prayers before engaging in programmes (tuition, Silat, soccer, etc). After that, its solat Isyak before having their night snack. Bedtime is at 10pm when it is time for lights off.

The introduction of routines has made the managing of the Home to be more efficient and organized. InshaAllah, with routines and rituals firmly entrenched, the environment at Darul Ma'wa can be a conducive place for the positive development of the residents.

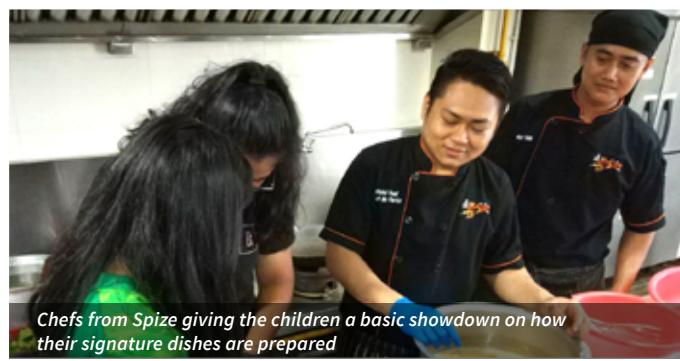

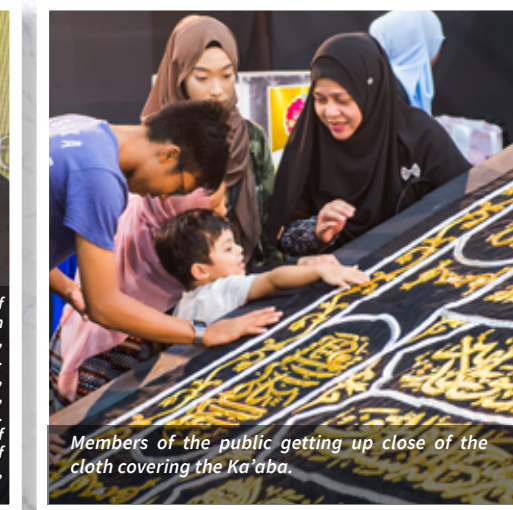

Many things have been said about the “Islah Boys”. Hardworking, rough, tough, accommodating, even quiet and unassuming. Many also know them to have been through a lot – the “been there done that” mantra visibly hanging in the bubble above their heads. The scars and lines on their bodies and faces and for some, tattoos on their arms and backs add to the aura of a life well worn out.

The Jamiyah family knows all too well the hardiness of the “Islah Boys”. They are there during events. Usually the first to arrive and to start work, way before others begin theirs. They are also still hacking away, stacking chairs and packing equipment, cleaning and tidying making sure the place is as tidy as before the event happened, long after the last guest has left.

The Ever-Ready Brigade

Islah Boys

These hardworking and highly dependable helping hands are individuals who are in their last leg of their journey towards rehabilitation from substance abuse. They are sons, brothers, husbands, fathers, even grandfathers who are tenaciously fighting the scourge of drugs that have engulfed their lives and isolated them from their families. Darul Islah is where they get reintegrated into the community. Started in 1995, when the then Prison-run Clementi Drug Rehabilitation Centre was handed over to Jamiyah, residents immersed themselves in work programmes reinforced by individual and group therapeutic sessions which can either be peer or professional-led. Taken as a Learning Centre, the halfway house operates under the Halfway House New Service Model (HSM) administered by the Singapore Prison Service (SPS). These individuals acquire the skills and knowledge necessary for them to be economically productive and responsibly contributing members of the community.

Darul Islah also represents a reconnection with the individual’s spiritual self. The reflection of their past deeds and the impact these had on the lives of their family members and their loved ones, done during the serenity of the Fajr prayers at the break of dawn or the Tahajjud during the quiet of the night, reaches and touches the core of their spiritual being.

Staff of Darul Islah - from the Head, through the Social and Case Workers, all the way to the Programme, Care and Support Staff - work continuously, 24/7, to ensure the “Islah Boys” maintain their continued sobriety. Through a behavioristic system of rewards and consequences, the molding and establishment of new coping skills meant to be applied to triggers and dangerous situations, the “Islah Boys” inch ever closer to their families and inch ever further away from the illegal substances. This highly potent combination of tenacity from the residents and dedication from the staff is really the stuff that can make Darul Islah be the agent that turns the “Islah Boys” to be sons, brothers, husbands, fathers and even grandfathers once again. InshaALLAH.



The Commitment of a Stalwart Volunteer

For 45 years, Mdm Zainab Khamis, or more fondly known as “Mak Nab” channelled her cooking skills towards contributing to the community. The wife of former Jamiyah President, Allahyarham Haji Abu Bakar Maidin, actively involved herself as a volunteer for the Women’s Department in Jamiyah, before retiring her cooking classes some 5 years ago.

Through the encouragement of her late husband, and passion for serving the community, Mdm Zainab, now 82 years old, conducted cooking classes as part of a Jamiyah programme. 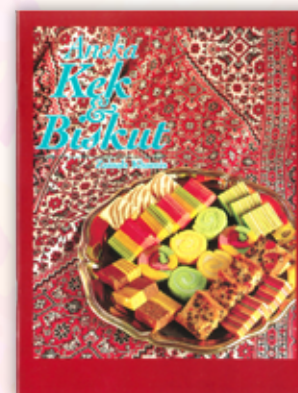

“Suddenly, there were 120 individuals who registered for the first class. So, we had to split them into two classes- one day for the homemakers and another day for those who are working”.

Mdm Zainab lovingly explained, her love for cooking has always been there since she was very young. Before starting her cooking classes in Jamiyah, Mdm Zainab previously organised cooking classes for her own friends. A variety of Malay dishes, cakes and biscuits were taught by her for all the participants of the cooking classes in Jamiyah.

She charged a token fee to the participants of her classes. The fee collected was then channelled towards Jamiyah, until this charity organization, then led by Allahyarham Haji Abu Bakar, subsequently managed to introduce various community programmes for the betterment of Singaporeans.

Jamiyah and the Magic of Networking & Goodwill Relations

Jamiyah's founder, Maulana Abdul Aleem Siddique (1892-1954) would not have been called "Roving Ambassador of Peace" in three separate books published in Mauritius, South Africa and Singapore respectively if he had not been endowed with the qualities of Peace. He had been trained and disciplined by his parents and his teacher Imam Ahmad Reza Khan, acclaimed by top scholars in pre-Saudi Mecca and Madinah, and across the Muslim world. His teacher had thousands of students in Mauritius, South Africa and India which provided our Maulana with moral support as and when needed in his 40-year global journeys for World Peace and Inter Faith Harmony.

Realizing the need for unity within the Muslim community, Maulana brought his vision to the Egyptian Leader Muhammad Allouba Pasha. The latter then brought together the leaders of the different schools of Islam enthusing them

with his vision of World Peace which had been shattered by World War I. His contacts were not merely the top ranking Church, Jewish, Buddhist, Taoist, Hindu, Sikh leaders, etc but skeptics and agnostics as well. As an example, George Bernard Shaw met him at Mombasa and said, "This will be the most memorable part of my journey.....He is truly a sage". Then there was the nuclear physicist Dr. Antonoff and the creative thinker Marya Levinskya who were inspired to write *Reverent Science or Scientific Religion* especially when they came under the influence of Maulana's protégé Hafiz Fazlur Rahman Ansari. Mr Ansari later became an Editor at the Singapore headquarters of All Malaya Muslim Missionary Society (AMMS) whose international *Genuine* magazine enthused many civil servants and Britishers. Among them was Singapore's first Olympian Valberg, the future Attorney General Dr. Ahmad Ibrahim, and the Gandhian peace entrepreneur, Rev. C.F Andrews.

Maulana had been in contact with Dato Syed Ibrahim Omar Alsagoff, President of the AMMS (now known as Jamiyah Singapore) and the latter had gathered around him the leaders of the Malay/Muslim community including the Aljunied, Mattar, AlHabshi, Alsagoff clans. The Indian Chulias and Salleh and Ibrahim Ma from a long line of Chinese Muslims also joined. They gained the support consecutively of Governors Franklin Gimson and Robert Black and in particular, the British Commissioner for South East Asia Malcolm MacDonald. With Dato Syed Ibrahim's powerful links with diplomats, non-Muslim leaders and philanthropists such as Dato Lee Kong Chian and the "Cattle King" Kader Sultan, it was the right time to establish the world pioneering Inter-Religious Organisation of Singapore and Johore Baru in early 1949.

It was crucial to have Church leaders such as Rev. Olcomendy and Rev Amstutz, the Buddhist leader Ven Sek Hong Hoon, Kartar Singh, Parsi Behram Wakil leader A.K. Isaac and Swami Vamadevanda. Muslim leaders such as the Mufti of Johore Syed Alwi Al-Hadad and Chief Kathi of Singapore Haji Ali Hj Mohd Said were also involved.

With leaders of Jamiyah's branches in peninsula Malaya and the complete support of the Sultan of Selangor, Dato Syed Ibrahim worked with his organising committee and established the Kolej Islam after obtaining the donation of the Istana from the Sultan himself. Not only was he able to bring down the top graduate of Al Azhar Muhammad Abdul Rauf, to head the College but secured the co-patronship of *Genuine Islam* by the Shaykh Al Azhar, Sh.Muhammad Mustafa Maraghi himself. All these was due to the magic of sincere and solid networking. King Faisal also donated large sums for the maintenance of the College.

Grabbing the Bull by its Horns

In August 1965 Singapore was politically separated from Malaysia. The independent Republic of Singapore was progressing tremendously particularly in the public sector. The Malay/Muslim community could use the tripartite principle involving the Government, the NGOs and the public

to speed up progress in the community. It was left to Haji Abu Bakar who had succeeded Dato, to give the words "balanced education, charity and interfaith harmony" a greater relevance. With the cooperation and support of the relevant Government departments, he set up separate Welfare Homes such as Jamiyah Children's Home for less fortunate children (especially orphans) Jamiyah Home for the Aged (generally for the homeless elders) Jamiyah Nursing Home (for those requiring protracted nursing care) and lastly Jamiyah Halfway House (for recovering addicts) under the Community Based Release Programme of the Prison Dept. Meanwhile, balanced educational classes proliferated at Jamiyah and at its centres. With the recommendation of Jamiyah hundreds of scholarships and financial grants for primary, secondary and tertiary education locally and abroad were given by the Lee Foundation, Singapore Buddhist Lodge and the Shaw Foundation who helped substantially in the welfare field together with the Kwan Imm Thong Hood Cho Temple and the Mini Environment Services.

In 1999, the late Haji Abu Bakar set up the Jamiyah Business School to provide tertiary education in Languages, Halal F&B, Computer Science and other disciplines with the complete support of the Education Department, then under Dr. Mohd Hasbi Abu Bakar. Several regional and international organisations worked hand in hand with Jamiyah during his tenure of office including ISESCO, RISEAP, Dunia Melayu Dunia Islam, Motamar Al Alam Al Islami, Rabita Al Alam Al Islami and the Islamic Development Bank (IDB). For the building of the 4 storey Islamic Centre Jamiyah and the addition of another 3 storeys, the IDB, the Rabitah hundreds of mosques in peninsula Malaysia came forward to support Jamiyah, not to forget the generous Malay / Muslim community of Singapore.

Jamiyah Singapore, the Singapore Buddhist Lodge and the Hindu Endowment Board worked with their partners in the IRO to gather funds for disaster relief in the region such as in Myanmar, Pakistan and Indonesia. Jamiyah garnered the support of the Malay Muslim community of Singapore to set up a hundred solid wells for the impoverished community in Cambodia together with a building for the provision of a school. Earlier it accommodated their orphans for three months in Singapore to teach them English, Maths and Computer Literacy in addition to practical morality.

More Networking Initiatives

Jamiyah later launched an Inter Faith Studies Programme at the Jamiyah Business School to provide greater understanding of the ten different faiths and this was continued for a time at the OneSingapore.com premises. This facilitated networking and camaraderie. Even though Jamiyah Business School had become privatised as JBS International College Jamiyah continued to support it because it was set up to prioritise the education of the poor and needy. It was not surprising that the Abu Bakar Maidin Memorial Scholarship Fund was set in honour of Haji Abu Bakar Maidin's contributions.

The poor and needy always came first. A Food Bank followed in 2016 to render the support to hundreds of impoverished families and to help them focus their time on acquiring new skills. As was the policy of the Jamiyah Medical Clinic and the Jamiyah Legal Clinic, it was open for all who qualify, regardless of race or religion. Jamiyah became the local Secretariat for the Dunia Melayu Dunia Islam for Malay/Muslim cultural and educational purposes while regular sports events were arranged with Jamiyah Selangor and Jamiyah Malacca etc to build upon the fraternal relationship with our former branches.

Signing the Memorandum of Understanding with the International Islamic University Malaysia (IIUM) was a logical progression. Jamiyah also contributed to the setting up of the Muslim College in Klang, Malaysia. It had brought down Dr. Muhammad Abdul Rauf from Egypt to head the College which precipitated the setting up of the IIUM and not surprising, Dr. Muhammad Abdul Rauf became the first Rector of the IIUM. Equally not surprising was the MOU signed with the International Institute of Islamic Thought (IIIT) which focused on contemporising Islamic Thought within the paradigm of the Quran and the Sunnah. It was within this same strive for excellence that Jamiyah signed an MOU with yet another prominent educational institute namely the Sharif Hidayatullah Islamic University in Jakarta.

Inter-faith and intra-faith activities continue to be emphasised given their peace dividends. The Muslim Youth Peace Ambassadors in Singapore was expanded to become Muslim Youth Ambassadors of Peace International. These networking and goodwill relationships at governmental, NGO and other levels will continue to be pursued by Jamiyah in years to come.



Jamiyah Singapore's Official Visit to Egypt & Kuwait

Visiting Kafrelsheikh University

Recently, President of Jamiyah, Dr. Mohd Hasbi Abu Bakar, accompanied by Chairman of Jamiyah Education Centre, Dr. Hussin Mutalib and Senior Executive, Ustaz Andi Kitta, made an official visit to Kafrelsheikh University in Cairo. They were warmly received by the Chancellor (President) of the University, Prof. Dr. Maged Elkemary and other professors from the university. A Memorandum of Agreement was then signed between Prof Maged and Dr. Mohd Hasbi for both Kafrelsheikh and Jamiyah to collaborate on programs and projects of mutual benefit. Subsequently, Jamiyah President also visited Kuwait.

Although a relatively new university if compared to Al-Azhar and Cairo Universities, Kafrelsheikh's University is equipped with modern facilities, including state of the art language centers, Nano Labs, engineering and medical faculties, and other facilities - including a full-fledged hospital - all located within a large, sprawling campus, about two hours' drive from Cairo city.

Jamiyah Singapore invited His Excellency Prof Maged and two professors of Arabic Language from his University's Centre of Languages to visit us to conduct a one-week Arabic language program in Singapore. The program would involve a series of workshops, lectures and training sessions involving Arabic language teachers in particular and the asatizah community in general. Both Public Seminars and private workshops with Arabic language teachers are being planned, insyaAllah.

Other than familiarizing the public about Kafrelsheikh University, we hope that using Kafrelsheikh's Arabic language curriculum will enable our teachers/students to receive some form of accreditation from the University.

This annual Award, held at the well-known Cairo University, was to honor mothers from different parts of Egypt and Middle East and others (including from Singapore) for their unstinting sacrifice and contributions to their family and society.

The proud mothers received their shields and plaques from Egypt's Minister of Social Affairs, while the President of Egypt, President Sisi, welcomed many of the delegates and congratulated their achievements.



Hari ini, kemajuan teknologi, seluas dan secepat yang tidak pernah dialami dahulunya, ditambah pula dengan tekanan globalisasi, telah membuat dunia kita bukan sahaja lebih kompleks tetapi menjadi sebuah ‘perkampungan’ berbagai rumpun bangsa, kaum, agama dan budaya. Mendiami di dalam dunia sebegini memberi kita tiada lain pilihan melainkan untuk menangani hakikat baru ini dengan penuh bijaksana.

Seperti diketahui umum, Singapura mempunyai sejarah yang begitu lama dalam memperjuangkan semangat berbilang kaumnya. Mujur juga, di dalam jangkamasa tersebut Republik ini telah berjaya untuk mentransformasikan negara ini - secara berperingkat - dari sebuah ‘negeri berbilang kaum’ kepada sebuah ‘negara berbilang budaya’. Amat jelas bahawa perbezaan di antara kepelbagaian kaum dan kepelbagaian budaya lebih dari hanya sekadar nama sahaja. Pendekatan ‘Berbilang Kaum’ melihat masyarakat majmuk dan pelbagai kaum sebagai suatu tanggung-jawab yang perlu diwaspadai dan dikawal perkembangannya, sedang ‘Berbilang Budaya’, melihat kepelbagaian kaum sebagai suatu aset yang harus diraikan.

Sementara pemerintah menjalankan tanggung-jawabnya melalui berbagai polisi integrasi, tentunya kita sebagai rakyat Singapura juga harus mendukung usaha sedemikian. Hanya dengan cara begini, kita dapat mengekalkan hubungan mesra berbilang kaum dan agama yang kita nikmati di Republik kita ini yang merupakan sebuah taman kehidupan yang disegani banyak negara di serata dunia. Di Jamiyah Singapura, kita lebih dari mendukung prinsip berbilang kaum di setiap kegiatan dan aktiviti kita. Kita mengambil pendekatan yang inklusif, bukan sahaja dalam berurusan dengan masyarakat Islam kita yang majmuk, tetapi juga di dalam hubungan kita dengan rakan senegara Singapura dari latar-belakang bangsa dan agama yang berbeza.

Malahan komitmen terhadap prinsip ‘Kesatuan Dalam Kepelbagaian’ yang diabadikan dengan sifat kita menerima akan ‘orang luar’ kedalam masyarakat kita, telah wujud di Jamiyah Singapura sejak ianya diasaskan dalam tahun 1930an. Dan kita amat komited dalam meneruskan misi ini lebih-lebih lagi dalam gejalok kaum yang menjejaskan kebanyakan Negara hari ini.

Justeru itu, khusus dalam edisi ini, bagi Cerita Utama (yang lambangnya kami coretkan di Muka Depan Majallah VOI (Suara Islam) ini, kami ingin berkongsi dengan para pembaca beberapa contoh peristiwa, projek dan kegiatan yang menunjukkan komitmen kami terhadap usaha murni dan bermakna ini. Tentunya, kami juga ingin memberi laporan terkini akan apa yang telah dilaksanakan sejak penerbitan VOI yang lalu. Maka dimuatkan juga sorotan pelbagai kegiatan dan perkembangan di dalam Jabatan-Jabatan, Rumah-Rumah Kebajikan dan Pusat-Pusat Pendekatan dan Pembangunan Masyarakat, Dakwah, Pusat-Pusat Pendidikan, Jabatan Pengumpulan Dana, Bank Makanan, Rumah-Rumah Kebajikan, Rumah Peralihan, Latihan dan Pembangunan, dan sebagainya.

Dalam minggu-minggu dan bulan-bulan mendatang, lebih banyak kegiatan dan peristiwa telah kami rancang, di Singapura mahupun di arena antarabangsa, bersama-sama rakankongsi kami yang lain. Ini pastinya membuat kakitangan, para sukarelawan serta penyokong-penyokong Jamiyah Singapura sibuk dengan tugas-tugas masing-masing yang telah diamanahkan – dan insyaAllah, kami bercadang untuk berkongsi sama dengan anda, semua kegiatan ini di isu yang akan datang. إن التطورات التكنولوجية اليوم والذي لم يتحقق مدى خبرتها من قبل -بمساعدة قوة العولمة- جعل عالمنا ليس أكثر تعقيدا فحسب بل أصبحت قرية متعددة متنوعة بشكل واضح والعيش في مثل هذا العالم متنوع العقائدية الدينية، لا يوفر لنا خيارا آخر قابل للتطبيق ولكن إدارة هذا الواقع القاسي بحكمة.

في الوقت الذي تقوم فيه الحكومة بدورها من خلال سياسات تكاملية متعددة، فيجب علينا السنغافوريون أن نقف وراء هذا السعي كي يمكننا أن نحافظ على ملاذ العرقى الديني الذي نتمتع به في هذه الجمهورية، وهو الملاذ الذي يحسد عليه العديد من البلدان في جميع أنحاء العالم وهنا نحن في جمعية الدعوة الإسلامية بسنغافورة أكثر من تبني مبدأ تعدد الثقافات في جميع أنشطتنا ومبادراتنا فننعمد على هذا النهج الشامل ليس فقط في تعاملنا مع مجتمعنا المسلم المتنوع ولكن في علاقتنا مع الزملاء السنغافوريين من خلفيات عرقية دينية أخرى وفي الواقع، هذا الالتزام نحو "الوحدة في التنوع" - يتميز بإقامتنا "مع الآخرين" حيث إنه قد كان موجودا في الجمعية بسنغافورة منذ سنوات تأسيسها في الثلاثينات ونحن ملتزمون بمواصلة هذه المهمة، ويكون أكثر من ذلك في وقت يبدو فيه الاضطراب الديني العرقى يلحق بالعديد من البلدان.
